Eight short, comforting readings — large print, easy to read aloud

1. The Shepherd Who Comes Looking

Jesus told of a shepherd with a hundred sheep. When one wandered off, he left the ninety-nine and searched the hills until he found it — and carried it home on his shoulders, rejoicing. There are seasons when we feel lost, or forgotten, or too far gone to be found. But that has never once stopped the Shepherd. He goes looking. And when He finds you, He doesn't scold — He lifts you up and carries you home.

“There is rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents.” — Luke 15:7

Rest on this: You are worth going after. You always have been.

2. Enough for Today

When God fed His people in the wilderness, the bread came every morning — just enough for that day. They had to trust Him again the next morning, and the next. Growing older can feel like the future holds more questions than answers. But God has never asked us to carry tomorrow. He gives what we need for today, and meets us again with fresh mercy at first light.

*“His compassions never fail. They are new every morning.” —
Lamentations 3:22–23*

Rest on this: You have enough grace for today. Tomorrow will have its own.

3. He Will Carry You

Through the prophet Isaiah, God made a promise not to the young and strong, but to the aging and gray: that He Himself would carry them, all the way to the end. You may not be able to do all you once did. But your worth was never in what you could do — it was always in whose you are.

“Even to your old age... I am He who will sustain you... I will carry you.”
— Isaiah 46:4

Rest on this: You are not a burden. You are being carried by the One who loves you.

4. The Lord Is My Shepherd

Perhaps no words have comforted more hearts than the twenty-third Psalm. A shepherd-king wrote them, remembering green pastures and still waters — and a God who walked with him even through the darkest valley. When you say them aloud, you are handing back a lifelong friend.

“The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want... I will fear no evil: for thou art with me.” — Psalm 23:1,4

Rest on this: Wherever the path leads, you do not walk it alone.

5. Come and Rest

To people worn down by heavy burdens, Jesus gave one of His tenderest invitations. He did not offer them more to do. He offered them Himself, and rest. Some days the burden is a tired body; some days it is worry, or loneliness, or grief. To all of it, the invitation is the same: come. Lay it down. Rest here a while.

“Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.” — Matthew 11:28

Rest on this: You don't have to earn your rest. It is offered as a gift.

6. Fear Not

Again and again through Scripture, God meets frightened people with the same three words: “Fear not.” Not because there was nothing to fear — but because He was with them in it. The years can bring new fears: of falling, of forgetting, of being alone. Into every one, God speaks the same steady promise.

“Fear thou not; for I am with thee... I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee.” — Isaiah 41:10

Rest on this: The same hand that made you is the hand that holds you now.

7. A Light for the Path

An ancient traveler carried a small lamp that lit only the next step or two — never the whole road. And that was enough. We often wish we could see the whole road ahead. God rarely gives us that. What He gives is light for the next step, and His promise to be there when we take it.

“Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path.” — Psalm 119:105

Rest on this: You only need the next step, and He gives it.

8. Nothing Can Separate Us

Near the close of his letter to the Romans, Paul made a bold and sweeping promise: that nothing in all creation — not life nor death — could ever separate us from the love of God in Christ. Not failing memory. Not failing health. Not the passing of the years.

“Neither death, nor life... shall be able to separate us from the love of God.” — Romans 8:38–39

Rest on this: Nothing you face today can put you outside the love of God.
